Absences: general, sick, holidays

Parents and carers are required to explain the absences of their children from school within seven days from the first day of absence from school.

For absences of 1-10 school days the school can be notified by either filing the absence form on the SZapp, by email or a note can be provided to the teacher on the student's return to school.

Absences of 11 school days or more the Application for extended leave - travel form must be completed. This form can be downloaded from the School Bytes parent portal or the school website and must be submitted to the Principal with copies of the relevant travel documents and/or the itinerary prior to the absence.

Absences: late arrivals, early departures

Students are to be at school when the bell rings at 8.57am. If they are not in class by 9.00am they are to report to the office for a Late Pass.

Late Pass

If a child arrives late to school the parent and student are to report to the Office.

The parent/carer needs to sign in following school procedures and a late pass is issued.

The child takes the late pass to their class with them.

Early Pass

If a parent/carer wishes to collect their child before the end of the school day the procedures are:

The parent/carer goes to the office to sign their child out following school procedures.

Office staff issue an early departure pass.

Office staff will call the student to the office.

Attendance procedure

Emergency contact details

Emergency contact details are provided at the time of enrolment. In the event of an accident the school will use this information to contact either the parents/carers or their emergency contacts. Please inform the Administration Office via email or the ZApp of any changes to your contact details.

Enrolment

Step 1:

Apply online

Our new online enrolment process makes it easier and faster to enrol your child at your local school.

To apply online, you must:

- •be an Australian or New Zealand citizen or permanent resident
- •live in the local enrolment area of this school.

Step 2:

Collect the following documents which are required to support your child's enrolment at our school:

Proof of student's residential address as per 100 point residential check.

- Birth certificate and proof of citizenship by way of passport.
- Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) Immunisation History Statement.

In addition any other documents required as per the application form.

Step 3:

The supporting documents must also be provided to the school as a record of evidence.



High school placement

Local high school placement is affected by a zoning system. Expressions of Interest are completed online via the school website

https://year7.enrol.education.nsw.gov.au/?schoolCode=3984 in term 1.

A selective high school information notification is distributed electronically to Year 5 students and placement testing is conducted in March of the following year; parents/carers are notified in early July of the outcome.

Lost property

All Lost Property is stored in locations in the K-2 and 3-6 area. Each term, the baskets are emptied and any items with names are returned to the students. All unnamed or un-returnable clothing is given to our second hand uniform shop. All drink bottles and lunch boxes are disposed of for health reasons.

Your child's health and safety

Allergies

While the school strives to be a 'nut free' environment, the school cannot guarantee it is free of allergy producing products. The school urges students, parents and carers not to send high risk foods to school and students are discouraged from sharing food.

All parents and carers are required to provided accurate, current medical information to the school, including medical plans for the management of severe allergies. Staff are informed as to the medical conditions of potential anaphylactic and other severely allergic students and are trained in anaphylaxis awareness including the use of Epi-Pens.

Birthday Treats

At BNPS, we recognize and appreciate the importance of celebrating a student's birthday. Parents have been supporting their children in observing their special day by providing treats to share with their classmates. In order to make it more convenient at school, we suggest considering icy poles as a delightful alternative to traditional sweets. A Birthday Bucket of Quelch Sticks can be easily arranged through the school canteen also. If you would rather your child does not receive treats when they are brought into class, please contact your child's teacher to let them know.

Canteen

Our school operates a registered healthy school canteen, providing healthy food and drink options. The menu is regularly updated and published in the school newsletter and uploaded onto the school website. Orders are placed through flexischools.

Dogs

It is a Department of Education & Training regulation that dogs <u>are not allowed</u> in the school grounds, at any time, even if on a leash. Dogs found wandering the school will be restrained and the local council contacted.



Emergency procedures

Balgowlah North Public School has an emergency procedure to deal with a variety of situations. The students and staff practise these procedures at regular intervals during the year. These procedures are; Lockdown, Evacuation, Environmental Alert and Early Cessation of Operation. We are a category 2 school for bush fires and we must cease operations if the bush fire warning is catastrophic.

First Aid

Students with minor injuries are treated by school staff. Parents and carers or the nominated emergency contact will be notified if further medical attention is required.

Immunisation and infection

NSW Health recommends that all children entering school be fully immunised and have booster shots prior to school enrolment. An immunisation history statement must be lodged with an enrolment application. The immunisation history statement can be downloaded from the myGov website.

Medication and medical history

Medication will only be administered to a child, if a Permission to Administer form is given to the office with the prescribed medication in its original packaging with name and dosage on it. This form can we accessed by the School Bytes parent portal.

Class teachers are not permitted to provide students with any medication, including headache tablets.

Please advise the school if your child has any medical condition that requires treatment plans, and submit these plans and any medication to the office at the start of each year. If there are any changes to your child's medical history and/or treatment please inform the office in writing.

Playground equipment

Playground equipment is for students' use only during school hours under teacher supervision. The school does not accept responsibility if a child (student or non-student) injures themselves outside school hours without teacher supervision.

Sunsmart

The school implements the Cancer Council's recommendations including developing positive attitudes towards skin protection, lifestyle practices which can help reduce the incidence of skin cancer. The school expects students to wear the school broad brimmed hat all year round and will have to stay under the COLA if they don't have a hat.

Additional curriculum programs

Excursions and incursions

Excursions and incursions provide stimulus and enrichment for class learning programs. They are organised by teachers and always have the approval of the Principal. As required, teachers will request volunteers to assist with excursion organisation, the assistance of helpers during class excursions is greatly appreciated.

Prior to each excursion or incursion, a permission note explaining the nature of each excursion or incursion and cost is emailed via School Bytes to parents and carers. Unless otherwise stated, students must wear full school uniform when attending an excursion/incursion.

Green Grove

Every Tuesday and Thursday lunchtimes our beautiful Green Grove garden is open for anyone in the school to visit. It provides students with hands-on experiences in creating and maintaining edible garden beds and opportunities to look after our chickens. We have worm farms and composting systems which the children learn about and use to nourish their plants.

There is a strong emphasis on sustainability and environmental education. The school is diligent in recycling paper, hard/soft plastics and e-waste. The Student Representative Council are responsible for the Composting Program.

High potential gifted education

Gifted students are those whose potential is distinctly above average in one or more of the following areas of ability at school - intellectual, creative, social and physical.

Homework

Regular homework is set in all years to consolidate classroom learning and develop essential home study skills. There is a school Homework Policy which is explained in detail to all parents at the Parent/Teacher night at the beginning of each year. It is recommended that parents read with and listen to children's reading each night.

Home reading program

Home readers are provided to students in Years K to 2. The home reading program allows students to practise reading skills learnt in class. It is designed to improve students' fluency and expression through exposure to texts which the students can read independently. Parents and carers are encouraged to support the home reading program by listening to their child read on a regular basis.

Learning and support

Our school Learning and Support programs assist our teachers in supporting students with identified learning, social, emotional or behavioural needs. Programs are planned in response to the identified support needs of our school community. Strategies involve small group teaching, individual instruction or team teaching with a specialist Learning and Support Teacher. Specific evidence based programs that are included in Learning and Support include the Macquarie University Literacy Intervention Program (Minilit) and UR Strong social skills curriculum. The Learning and Support team also run social skills support groups including Deck Games, Lego Club and Games Club. The Diverse Learners Team monitors all students needing support in the school

Library

The Library is the resource centre of the school and is open Monday to Friday. It aims to develop a passion for reading through literature lessons and assist in the development of infor-mation skills throughout the school. Each class has a weekly library lesson during which time students borrow and return books. Students need a library bag to protect books during transit from school to home. Loans are for one week only. The cost of damaged or lost books are required to be reimbursed to the school.

Creative Arts

Students from K to 6 classes have music and dance lessons as part of the school's Creative Arts program.

School Counsellor

The School Counsellor assists with programs for students with additional needs and special school placements. She is onsite on Wednesdays and Thursdays. All appointments with the School Counsellor are made through the Diverse Learners team.

SEAT - Scripture (Catholic or Combined), Ethics and Additional Time

SEAT teachers attend the school every Thursday afternoon to facilitate scripture and ethics classes.

Sport

Sport is an integral part of the school's Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE) curriculum and students of all ability levels are catered for through the school's sport programs.

The school is a member of the Manly Primary School Sports Association (PSSA). This association consists of 12 local Public Schools and organises zone carnivals and competitions including the Friday afternoon competitive sports program for students in Years 4 to 6. Students not involved in PSSA competitions participate in the school sport program. The program offered includes tennis, futsal, basketball, hockey, orienteering. This is subject to change from term to term.

School carnivals are held during the year for Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics. Winners from school carnivals proceed to Manly Zone carnivals then to Sydney North Regional carnivals and finally to State and National championships.

Students are grouped into four sport houses, Koala, Kangaroo, Wombat & Wallaby. Siblings are placed in the same house.



Learning at our school

Technology

Students have access to a wide range of technology in both the classroom and the library. Students have access to iPads and laptops to support them in their learning within the classroom.

Use of the internet and online communication services provided by the NSW Department of Education is intended to provide a secure and safe environment for communication and for research and learning.

Students across the school enjoy practical, hands-on opportunities to develop essential 21st century skills through the use of technology and robotics. They learn coding, visual programming and problem-solving skills using robots such as Lego EV3 Mindstorms, Bluebots, Dash robots and Micro:bits.





Year 2 swimming scheme

Students in Year 2 attend a two week intensive swimming program during Term 2. This is a program run by NSW Department of Education to improve students swimming and water safety skills.

Extra curricular activities

Bands and String ensemble

The school's band/string program comprises of three bands and a string ensemble open to students in Years 3 to 6:

- Junior band
- Senior band
- Concert band
- String ensemble

Each of the bands has a Band conductor, a paid professional who oversees the musical development of the Band.

At the beginning of each year all players undergo an assessment to determine instrument/s for which they are most suited.

Students who wish to participate in band must be prepared to devote out of class time to tutorial lessons for their instrument as well as band rehearsals. The bands rehearse twice a week, either before or after school or during lunchtime.

The bands perform at school events, during assemblies, Education Week performances and the school's performance evening along with a number of community based concerts. More information about the band is available on the Balgowlah North website: bnpsband



Learning at our school

Chess

The Chess Club meet weekly at lunchtimes in the library and tutelage is provided by the Sydney Academy of Chess. During the lessons, students from Kindergarten to Year 6 are involved in solving a range of puzzles and then challenge one another to competitive games.

Choir

Choir is a very important part of the creative arts program at Balgowlah North PS and offers children the opportunity to develop singing skills and performance technique.

All children in years three to six are invited to join the choir. The choir practices first half lunch every Wednesday. The children learn a variety of songs which may include the Arts Unit repertoire especially selected for the NSW schools performance at the Sydney Opera House.

Dance ensemble

The Senior Dance Ensemble consists of a small group of talented stage 3 students. They are an enthusiastic group of skilled dancers, who recognise the importance of teamwork, attendance and following school expectations.

With a big focus on student input and ideas, the students are involved in researching appropriate dance moves. The group will have opportunities to perform their dance throughout the year with school performances as well as in state-wide competitions.

Drama Ensemble

The Drama Ensemble is made up of 24 students from Stage 2 who were successful at audition to join the group. It is coordinated by our Dance/Drama Teacher. The students write their own script and perform at the Sydney North Drama festival at the Concourse at Chatswood. If successful at the local level there is the opportunity to perform at the DET State Drama Festival at the Seymour Centre. They also perform at assemblies and school performances.

Debating

BNPS has been involved in the Premier's Debating Challenge for the last 7 years. There are two teams made up of year 5 and 6 students who debate various topics ranging anywhere from issues in education to fitness and health. There is also a debating club here at school which is an ideal way to introduce structured debating coaching. Masters Academy is the leading provider of debating and public speaking services to schools in NSW and they have offered extra-curricular, parent-paid debating programs to us, delivered on school grounds, for the last two years. The club is held before school on Wednesdays.

Green grove

Every Tuesday and Thursday lunchtimes our beautiful Green Grove garden is open for anyone in the school to visit. It provides students with hands-on experiences in creating and maintaining edible garden beds and opportunities to look after our chickens. We have worm farms and composting systems which the children learn about and use to nourish their plants. We are lucky to have the knowledgeable Sadie Melov, a parent at BNPS, to advise and guide us through new and exciting environmental activities and sustainable living. The Green Grove enables the students to take ownership of a special place in our school that they can be proud of.



Public speaking

Students in Years 3 to 6 are given the opportunity to participate in school and interschool public speaking programs and represent the school annually in the Bear Pit Speaking Competition.

Student reports

Student reports are provided at the end of Term 2 (Semester 1) and Term 4 (Semester 2). These reports assess a student's performance over the semester in specified outcomes in each key learning area.

Reports are based on a student's development within a stage:

- Kindergarten
- Years 1 and 2
- Years 3 and 4
- Years 5 and 6

Parent-teacher meetings

Parent-teacher meetings are held on a regular basis at the school. Parents and carers may request an interview at any time by emailing or phoning the school office.

- Term 1 Class information night & Parent-teacher interviews
- Term 2 Student reports
- Term 3 Teacher interviews on request
- Term 4 Student reports

Class information night

Early in Term 1 parents and carers are invited to attend a class information meeting which provides an opportunity to meet the teacher and other class parents. The teachers will provide an overview of the curriculum, an activity calendar specific to your class and answer your questions. These meetings form an important communication link between the home and the school.

Term overviews

Term overviews are emailed at the beginning of each term. The overview details the topics and concepts the students will be studying that term. The overview is a guide and the topics and concepts may vary.


The school is committed to providing a safe, secure and happy environment which encourages each student to:

- be actively connected to their learning,
- have positive and respectful relationships
- experience a sense of belonging to their school and community
- be respected, valued, encouraged, supported and empowered to succeed grow and flourish, thrive and prosper.

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)

Positive Behaviour for Learning is an educational framework that Balgowlah North Public School uses to bring together the whole-school community to contribute to developing a *positive*, safe and supportive *learning* culture for all students. At Balgowlah North Public School our PBL expectations are to be *responsible*, *respectful* and *safe*. Our school rules are underpinned by our shared belief that all members of our school community have:

- the right to learn
- the right to be safe
- the right to be treated with dignity and respect, and
- the responsibility to uphold these rights for others



Recognising Positive Behaviours

The most powerful form of recognition is feedback that empowers a student to feel supported in making positive choices about their learning and behaviour. Positive and supportive feedback that focuses on building self-concept is embedded in all aspects of our school community.

Individual Class Award Systems

Teachers develop and use systems designed to suit the needs of individual students and the unique qualities of each class. These are all underpinned by the BNPS school expectations of being safe, responsible and respectful. Teachers acknowledge or reinforce a particular behaviour with the intention of adding value to, and strengthening, that behaviour. Teachers use a wide variety of reinforcements including:

- Verbal feedback to promote self-regulation and intrinsic behaviour choices
- Stickers, stamps and other reward systems
- Displaying achievement to other teachers and students

School Wide Award System

Balgowlah North Public School also operates a formal recognition system. Our merit system encourages a continuity of positive behaviour based on our PBL program as students move from grade to grade throughout their school years.

Assemblies are hosted every fortnight, where students have the opportunity to receive Merit Certificates for excellent progress in their learning and demonstration of the school's PBL expectations. Whole-school assemblies to celebrate students who have achieved Principal's awards, Banners and Medals are held in weeks 5 and 10 of every term.

Wellbeing

Award structure

Students are recognised for their efforts to be safe, respectful and responsible learners using our award structure.



Citizenship award

Citizenship award is an important part of our PBL program. This award is presented to outstanding students who consistently exhibit our PBL values and behaviours. The Citizenship award is presented twice per term at a full school assembly to a student in Kindergarten to Year 2 and Year 3 to Year 6.

The school operates a formal levels of behaviour program Kindergarten to Year 6. This allows all students to recognise that choosing inappropriate behaviour will result in formal consequences. Underpinning this is our own PBL program and all consequences are designed to encourage students to choose safe, respectful and responsible behaviour.

For more serious behaviours parent contact and parent interviews may be required.

The PBL team consistently reviews the strategies for supporting students who have difficulty demonstrating our school values.

UR Strong

Our school implements UR Strong, a whole school strategy that empowers students to build friendship skills that create a culture of kindness in our school. UR Strong provides our students from Kindergarten to Year 6 with an explicit curriculum and common language for building interpersonal skills, developing positive relationships and managing conflict.UR Strong provides students with the opportunity to:

- Be proactive participants in managing their friendships
- Voice their feelings using simple, child-centered language
- Identify what is normal in friendship
- Recognise healthy and unhealthy friendships
- Learn the difference between a 'friendship fire' and 'mean on purpose' behaviour
- Develop conflict resolution strategies
- Understand the importance of self-compassion and 'kind on purpose' behavior

In addition to UR Strong, our school is underpinned by a core belief that all students have the right to feel safe, respected and valued in our school environment. We aim to provide an inclusive, nurturing school where students can become self-directed, life long learners who can create a positive future for themselves and the wider community. We are proactive in our approach to building a happy, friendly climate where all students can build connections and feel a sense of belonging. This is reflected in our anti-bullying plan which can be found on the school website.



Wellbeing

Assemblies

K to 6 school assemblies acknowledge students who demonstrate the school expectations. Years K to 2 and Years 3 to 6 assemblies are held on Mondays at 1:45pm. Recognition Assemblies are held in weeks 5 and 10 of Terms 1, 2 and 3 and week 5 of Term 4. Information about school assemblies is published in the school newsletter. Parents and carers are welcome to attend each of our assemblies.

Buddies

A buddy system has been developed in the school with Year 6 students matched up with the kindergarten children. This program helps senior students to develop a sense of responsibility and teaches them co-operation and tolerance. For Kindergarten students, the program helps them settle into school with new friends.

Activities regularly occur in classrooms and informally in the playground. Activities can include help at lunch, on excursions, reading and special days.





Cyber safety

The internet provides an opportunity to enhance students' learning experiences by providing access to information. Online communication also links students to a collaborative learning environment. When accessing the internet students are expected to adhere to the NSW Department of Education Online Communication Services: acceptable usage for school students.

The school also teaches students the information and communication skills necessary to use the internet effectively and appropriately including how to be cyber safe using the Digital Citizenship toolkit <u>Digital Citizenship - home</u> to empower your child to understand how their online behaviour affects themselves and others.

Deck games

Another area where we foster responsibility is our Deck Crew. These students volunteer themselves to guide our younger students to play interactively with large games on our deck area. The set up and pack away are also their responsibility.

Mobile phones

At Balgowlah North Public School, we aim to develop students who are lifelong learners, able to challenge themselves, create connections and contribute positively to our world. For the purposes of this procedure, 'communication devices' refers to mobile phones and smart watches.

In this technological age we understand there is a range of technology available including mobile telephones, smart watches, digital cameras, fitbits and other similar devices. We understand that some students may need to be in possession of a mobile phone at school for reasons relating to their safety when traveling to and from school. When these communication devices are misused by students they can be disruptive to students' welfare, socialisation and in some cases, cause various levels of harm. This can cause distress and breach the privacy of others.

If a parent feels it is necessary for their child to bring a communication device (mobile phone or smart watch) to school, then the rules for student use of mobile phones and smart watches in the school mobile device policy: Mobile device policy .pdf (nsw.gov.au)

Student leadership

School leaders

The school's Student leadership program is aimed at providing extensive opportunities for all stage 3 students to develop skills of cooperation and teamwork to enhance personal confidence, promote high self-esteem and develop a sense of pride in oneself and the school. In Year 6, 8 School Leaders are elected by their peers and perform duties such as:

- conducting assemblies
- organising Student Representative Council (SRC) meetings
- welcoming and thanking visitors
- assisting staff performing school duties e.g. supervision of canteen lines and lost property
- assisting staff and executive with special days and ceremonies.



House Captains

House Captains are elected by the Sporting Houses in the school. There are two House Captains and two House Vice Captains per house and they perform duties on special sporting days and carnivals. House Captains also organise sporting equipment, lunchtime activities and games.

Band Captains

All current Y5 band and strings members can stand for the Band Captain role.

Band Captains cannot hold another leadership role.

Children can self nominate and everyone is welcome to do so.

Speeches and elections will take place in term 4.

Concert Band and Year 5 and 6 Strings students vote for the Band Captains.

Band Captains will be announced and badges presented at the first K-6 assembly of T1.

The Band Captain reports to the Band Manager and Director of Bands. The role includes MC'ing at Band camp / Battle of the Bands / Performance showcases announcing and presenting musician of the month at K-6 assemblies throughout the year, running the votes for the school disco theme, helping to organise cake stalls for band fundraisers and representing the bands at band related incursions and excursions.

Monitors

Students in Year 6 are given the opportunity to fill a variety of alternate and inclusive leadership roles with the school. These roles includes Library Monitors, Sound Monitors and Sustainability Monitors. As a Monitor students are given the opportunity to develop the skills, values and attitudes needed for effective student leadership, to learn new skills, to work with others and to contribute to their school in a meaningful way.

Peer mediation

Our school-based Year 5, 'Peer Mediation' program focusing on the skills, values and attitudes needed for effective student leadership. This program helps supports our kindergarten students in conflict situations to hear each other's story and find a mutually beneficial way forward by offering a listening ear, then providing support through conversation (face to face) to solve the problem. Students attend a workshop where they will participate in activities that focus on problem solving, conflict resolution, active listening and communication. The program seeks to mix different key leadership messages which then allows our students to put their ideas into actions so they can become impactful leaders. They learn to be role models for other students to follow by:

Identifying the qualities of a good leader and recognise their own strengths Understand the effect their leadership can have on their school and peers Seek to foster positive friendships and look out for each other Develop a capacity to overcome difficulties and be resilient Learn how to work together as a team and cooperate with others Have fun

Student Representative Council (SRC)

At BNPS we like to foster responsibility in our students. We have our Student Representative Council (SRC) where elected students from each class guide decisions on improving an area of school and helping with fundraising for charities to help others less fortunate than ourselves. The reps liaise with their class and promote decisions and directions the council make.

Getting to and from school

Bikes

Bikes may be ridden to school by students in Years 3—6. Helmets must be worn and a bike licence issued to each student. Students must walk their bike through the school grounds. Bikes must be stored in the bike racks.



Change of normal procedure

Emergencies

Please call the Administration Office on 9949 4499 if an emergency changes the normal pickup procedures for your child. If the emergency occurs in the afternoon before pickup time, students will be encouraged to wait for collection in the Administration Office.

Early pickup by another adult

If your child is being collected early by someone other than yourself, please email or call the school office on the morning of the early departure, giving your permission, the name of the person collecting your child and the approximate time of collection.

If a situation arises during the day which necessitates a change of arrangements, please contact the Administration Office to inform them of the changes.

Kiss and drop

The school is located in a 40km school zone, where a 40km speed limit applies for the hours of 8:00-9:30am and 2:30-4:00pm on school days. The Kiss and Drop is located outside the school in Manning Street where parents/carers are allowed to stop for no more than 2 minutes to drop their children off and drive away. Please note drivers must stay with their vehicle at all times.





Contributions and funding

The NSW Department of Education provides an annual allocation of funds to assist the school to manage the costs associated with its operation.

Participation in additional or co-curricular activities provided to enrich the teaching and learning programs are not necessarily covered in this allocation and incur additional costs. Therefore, the school asks parents and carers to assist with funding these activities to ensure students benefit from a well-rounded education.

School and other contributions

School contributions are collected for the purpose of funding general classroom equipment and specific resources for each of the key learning areas.

Each term the school will email all families a statement of account from School Bytes which provides funding for additional materials for use in the classroom, technology contribution, sport contribution and additional programs. The cost of your child's participation in specific activities is invoiced on a cost-recovery basis. Specific activities may include competitions, excursions, incursions, dance, choir and drama participation costs, online learning resources, sporting opportunities and visiting artists.

Preferred method of payment

The school's preferred method of payment is online through the School Bytes Parent Portal. Parents are requested to register for the School Bytes Parent Portal where they can link children, give permission for school events, make payments and view their activity history. Other methods of payment are via the school's website or via the Schoolzine school app—"make a payment".
